

Dog Tethering Resolution

It has been proven that dogs chained (tethered) outside permanently or for extended periods suffer great psychological damage. An otherwise friendly dog becomes neurotic, unhappy, and often aggressive. Their necks can become raw and covered with sores from tight collars and straining to escape. Some chained dogs have collars embedded in their necks and the dogs often get tangled and can't access food, water and shelter. Chained dogs can also become aggressive. Dogs are protective of their territory and when confronted with a threat their fight-or-flight instinct kicks in. A chained dog,



unable to take flight, often feels forced to fight. On June 16th Blendon Township took a huge step tethering is now NOT in helping to protect animals in our community by voting for an Animal Tethering Resolution. Any township, city, county, or state that bans chaining is a safer, more humane community and I applaud the township for seeing the need for this regulation

and acting on it in a timely manner. Examples of when allowed include:

- For more than 6 hours in a 24 hour period or more than 2 consecutive hours
- Between the hours of 10 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- In inclement weather including extreme heat or cold

Transient Vendor License

Some people wonder what they can do about the pesky door-to-door salespeople. If you are wondering if they are even allowed to be in our neighborhood the easiest way to find out is to ask them if they have a "Transient Vendor License." If they do not, they are not to be in our neighborhood! Please call our non-emergency police line at (614) 889-9494 to let the dispatch know what street you are on and where the salesperson(s) are headed. One of our friendly officers will find them and speak to them. The full Rules and Regulations are on Blendon Township's website at http:// blendontwp.org/police/. Near the bottom of the page click on "Transient Vendor Resolution." To see an example of the permit click on "Example Vendor Permit." Vendors must purchase a permit in advance. Please report those not following the rules and regulations.

- With the use of a pinch/prong/or choke-type collar
- In a place that is unsanitary
- If the tether is unsuitable for the animal, causing discomfort or possibly causing injury or entanglement
- If no owner or occupant is present at the premises

The full resolution can be found on the Blendon Blendon Township website under the Agenda for the June 16, 2017 meeting. This is an amazing accomplishment for the solution and awareness are our

our township but as any rule is only as good as its enforcement. We need to work together to educate our neighbors on these restrictions and why they are in place. For those who do not follow the new regulations, it is up to us to report them. If you know or suspect someone is tethering their pet in a way not in accordance with these regulations, call the Blendon Township Police on the non-emergency number 614-889-9494. Education and awareness are our

greatest tools in fighting animal cruelty. Help our community spread the word about these new regulations as well as bring animal lovers together. Human Trafficking

Human trafficking is a form of modern slavery—a multi-billion dollar criminal industry that denies freedom to 20.9 million people around the world. And no matter where you live, chances are it's happening nearby. From the girl forced into prostitution at a truck stop, to the man discovered in a restaurant kitchen, stripped of his passport and held against his will. All trafficking victims share one essential experience: the loss of freedom. Unfortunately human trafficking is on the rise in Ohio and the U.S. with 277 cases of sex trafficking and 42 cases of labor trafficking reported in Ohio last year. The large majority of the victims are women and children. According to

Ohio officials, at any given time, 1,100 minors are being trafficked in Ohio with another 3,000 at risk.

There is no profile for a trafficker. In Ohio, traffickers have been men and women, business owners, parents, pastors, pimps, etc. All human traffickers, however, are skilled at exploiting their victims' vulnerabilities, including runaway and homeless youth, unaccompanied minors, migrant farm workers, foreigners, drug addictions, etc.

Ventilation Fans

Bathroom ventilation fan fires are a common occurrence. In fact, the Fire Division for Westerville and Blendon Township has seen an increase in calls related to bathroom ceiling exhaust fans. These ventilation fans are not made to run continuously. They are to be used for a period of time while exhausting the moisture in the bathroom. It is very important to turn your ventilation fan off before you go to bed or leave the house, or when it is not in use. Fires are caused when these ceiling fans in bathrooms are left running for a long period of time and overheat. Additionally, bathroom fans can build up lint and dust over time. Under the right conditions, the motor can overheat and ignite nearby combustible materials.

It is important to inspect and clean bathroom fans regularly. The Fire Division recommends removing the cover and using a vacuum attachment to clean the fan blade and its components. Make sure to shut off the circuit breaker prior to beginning to clean. Another recommendation: have your bathroom vent fan replaced by a certified electrician every 10 years. If you notice the noise level of the fan increasing or if the fan begins making any unusual noises, it may also be time for a replacement. The ultimate safety solution is to have an electrician replace the standard on/off switch with a timer that will automatically shut the fan off after 20 or 30 minutes.


Garden Railroad Tour
