## **Spring Gardening**

Spring is here and for those who enjoy gardening and playing in the dirt, it couldn't have come soon enough. If your fingers are tingling just thinking about pushing those seedlings into the ground, you're not alone.

While many common vegetables are frost sensitive; tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, and beans for example, and cannot be planted until mid-May, there are plenty that can be planted now. Once the ground can be worked in late March and early April, crops such as carrots, onions, peas, potatoes, beets, cabbage, and leafy greens are safe to be planted.


Because spring also brings lots of rain, be sure your garden bed has good drainage so plants do not become waterlogged and rot. Raised beds are perfect for this and can also provide a jump start on warmer soil.

There are also a wide variety of flowers you can plant for early color. Pansies, snapdragons, cannas, gladiolas, dahlias, and caladium will all brighten your yard before the heat of summer arrives.

Also please consider letting the dandelions in your yard continue to grow. Not only do they give a free burst of color but they are the first food source for the bees. Embracing the natural beauty of these flowers will not only free up more time to spend on your garden, but also help the bees, and us, survive!

If you don't have room in your yard for everything you want to grow consider cultivating a plot at the Blendon Township Community Garden. The plots are conveniently located behind the Blendon Township Administrative Office and just \$25 for township residents.

#### **Got Plants?**

This weather has been a real rollercoaster, hasn't it? I tried to get out and get my yard ready for spring, but haven't gotten my calendar in sync with the sunny days! There are plants and bulbs that have overgrown their relegated plots in my yard. When I dig them up, I could put them in my yard waste bag...

but NO! I have a better plan for my propogating leftovers: the annual HRAA Plant Swap!

For those of you who haven't participated in the past, we welcome you to our great group of gardeners! The swapping gets under way at 10 a.m. in the shelter at Ridgewood Park. You never know what will show up! The usuals are there: hosta, day lilies, assorted herbs, and assorted ground cover. Sometimes, we have hens and chicks, tomato seedlings, strawberries, and even trees and shrubs. There are even plants



that are unidentified when they are brought in. A couple of our friends will help with their cell phones and find out just what they are, as well as their care and feeding.

The best part of our plant swap is that you don't have to bring anything to take something home! There's more than enough for everyone who comes. This is also a great way to get to know your neighbors, get gardening tips, and go home with new additions that will help beautify your yard.

If you have been so fortunate that you have an abundance of plants, thin them out and put them in containers for sharing. Here are the simple guidelines to follow:

- •Put your plants in containers you can part with, so the recipients won't have to return them to you. Some of the best are disposable plastic cups or storage containers. Larger plants can be put it garbage bags with damp newspapers so they won't be too heavy.
- •Be sure to identify your plants, as well as you can, with all the information you have. Helpful facts about sun/shade, height, spreading, and water/drought tolerance would certainly be appreciated. If you don't have that information, bring them anyhow! Some of the local green thumbs might know, or will look them up for you.
- Try to keep roots in dirt, as bare roots are less likely to survive transplanting.

We look forward to seeing what is offered this year! I've been anticipating this year's swap, and identifying plants I need to take. I hope to see you there.

The moment the calendar announces the first day of Spring many of us start dreaming of the warm days ahead. While Ohio is notorious for teasing us with the weather before finally leveling out there are many activities for us to enjoy right away.

#### **Columbus Park of Roses**

As one of the largest public rose gardens in America, this is a must-see for all of us lucky enough to live so close. Created in 1953 it has over 12,000 roses of more than 400 varieties. Just last year many of the roses started blooming in mid-April (two weeks earlier than normal!) so be sure to pick a date to visit and enjoy the unique splendor of the park. Located in nearby Clintonville, the park is free to all visitors and is accessible to strollers and wheelchairs. parkofroses.org

#### **Short North Gallery Hop**

## **Community Coyotes**

Coyotes can be found in all areas of Ohio and while they prefer hilly farmland mixed with wooded areas, they have adapted to both suburban and urban areas. Nocturnal by nature, hunting from dusk to dawn, it is not as common to see them during the day but if they don't feel threatened, they are more likely to venture out in the daylight. These omnivores prefer a diet of small mammals, fresh fruits and vegetables, and insects, but won't pass up a dumpster meal.

Sightings have occurred in the Ridge but these dog cousins pose no danger to humans unless you choose to approach or try to feed one. However, if you have pets, it is important to keep your garbage secured and check your yard before allowing small animals outside, especially at night. Don't leave pet food out overnight and if you do happen to spot one in your yard, clap your hands or otherwise make noise to scare it off.

Unfortunately there is a lot of misinformation about these animals and many people use these fears as permission to harm or even kill them. For instance, coyotes typically do not travel or hunt in packs, and groups that are seen together are usually made up of a family with pups still too young to be left alone. So, if you see a coyote when you are out, there is no reason to fear that there are more around that will attack you. If you are walking a dog, keep them on leash and employ the same hazing you would do in your yard – making noise or even throwing small objects to drive it away. Although it may seem mean to run them off when they are just searching for food, it is best for everyone if they do not become acclimated to humans.

Unbelievably, coyote killing contests exist across the country and even here in Ohio with these events offering cash and other prizes for killing the most or biggest coyotes. These contests are brutal, inhumane, and promote cruelty to animals. Educate yourself and others on these beautiful animals that we are lucky to still live with and if you want to take it to the next level of advocacy, contact the Ohio Division of Wildlife and ask them to ban these horrifying contests.

By completing and submitting this form, you will be considered for competitive entry in the "Blooms" FREE garden tour and contest held Sunday, June 30, 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. The tour is publicized via various venues such as Facebook, the HRAA, Inc. website, and Dispatch media. Your photograph, address, and photos of your garden may appear on our Facebook pages (Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms) and in the HRAA, Inc. newsletter, The Herald. Your address only might be listed in Dispatch media as this tour is open to the public.

Applications will be accepted starting May 1 through the June 16 deadline. Completed entry forms must be delivered, mailed, or emailed to: Pam Clegg, 3614 Makassar Drive, 43081 blooms@huberridge.org and received no later than June 16, at 5 p.m.

#### **Eligibility:**

You must reside in the Huber Ridge or Sunbury Woods areas, be 18 or over, and have a tour-ready garden. Criterion for selection of a "tour-ready garden" include safety for visitors (no tripping hazards, etc.) and maintenance (weeding, trimming, deadheading etc.) in addition to a multitude of other factors such as landscape design, use of plants, curb appeal, environmental friendliness and overall aesthetics. A Blooms committee member(s) will predetermine and confirm your eligibility for the tour within three days of receiving your application. (You will be notified.) Entries may be limited. Front yard only entries are permitted.

#### **Agreement:**

\*Upon notification of eligibility, participants will receive a "Blooms" participant yard sign that will be placed in your front yard. You agree to keep your participant sign visible in

your front yard until 5 p.m. the day of the tour. (Participants will receive this yard sign not more than 30 days prior to the tour and/or within 3 days of selection.) Please return signs to Pam Clegg the day of the tour – at 6 p.m., when you attend the Gardener's Reception.

- \*Participants agree to maintain a smoke-free, alcohol-free, safe yard (no clutter/hazards) and manage pets and/or children (safety) while guests are present and while judges are judging.
- \*Participants agree to provide a "tour-ready garden" especially on tour day and be host/hostess on the day of the tour for the entire four hours; 1-5 p.m. This is for your safety as well as for the safety of those touring. If you cannot be home June 30, then please enter another year. Details about what to expect and do on tour day will be emailed or delivered to you.
- \*You agree to attend our annual Gardener's Reception held in Ridgewood Park, June 30 (tour day) from 6-7 p.m. After all, you worked hard and deserve refreshment and reward! Winners of the garden show will be announced at our Gardener's Reception and all prizes/gift bags will be distributed at this event as well. Remember to bring your Blooms yard sign with you to this event.
- \*Only judges/photographers should enter your yard prior to the tour. Judges and photographers will wear name tags and you will know who they are via email. Gardens will be judged between June 17 and June 24; hours and days yet to be determined. You will be notified in advance. You do not need to be home or outside during judging.

## **Trash Issues?**

One of the hot topics in the HRAA facebook group is missed trash pickup. If you find that your trash doesn't get picked up on trash day, typically Friday except on holiday weeks, here is what you can do. You can also find this information at www.huberridge. org under the FAQ section.

- 1. Call Rumpke to report ASAP at 1-800-828-8171. Document the date and time of the call. Also document the outcome of the call (ex. left message on voicemail, spoke to a representative who indicated someone would be out to pick up my trash in the afternoon, etc.)
- 2. Email the township to report the missed pickup with the details of your contact with Rumpke. Send email to refuse@blendontwp.org. This email goes to the Blendon Township Administrative office where the staff reaches out to the route supervisor every time a service complaint is emailed to this address.
