

There Goes the Sun

Monday, April 8, between approximately 2:00 and 4:30pm, Huber Ridge will experience the North American 2024 Solar Eclipse. While we are just outside the path of totality, we will have a pretty full partial eclipse. If you want to experience the full total eclipse, you only need to venture to the north end of Westerville or the Polaris Mall. There is an interactive map at www.eclipse2024.org where you can find the path of the eclipse.

No matter where you are, please use caution when viewing the eclipse. Here are some tips gathered from the NASA website.



Eye Safety During a Total Solar Eclipse

When watching the partial phases of the solar eclipse directly with your eyes, which happens before and after totality, you must always look through safe solar viewing glasses ("eclipse glasses") or a safe handheld solar viewer. Eclipse glasses are NOT regular sunglasses; regular sunglasses, no matter how dark, are not safe for viewing the Sun. Safe solar viewers are thousands of times darker and ought to comply with the ISO 12312-2 international standard. NASA does not approve any particular brand of solar viewers, but does have a list of suppliers of safe solar viewers and filters on their website.

You can view the eclipse directly without proper eye protection only when the Moon completely obscures the Sun's bright face – during the brief and spectacular period known as totality. (You'll know it's safe when you can no longer see any part of the Sun through eclipse glasses or a solar viewer.)

As soon as you see even a little bit of the bright Sun reappear after totality, immediately put your eclipse glasses back on or use a handheld solar viewer to look at the Sun.

If you don't have eclipse glasses or a handheld solar viewer, you can use an indirect viewing method, which does not involve looking directly at the Sun. One way is to use a pinhole projector, which has a small opening (for example, a hole punched in an index card) and projects an image of the Sun onto a nearby surface. With the Sun at your back, you can then safely view the projected image. Do NOT look at the Sun through the pinhole!

Skin Safety

Even during a partial or annular eclipse, or during the partial phases of a total eclipse, the Sun will be very bright. If you are watching an entire eclipse, you may be in direct sunlight for hours. Remember to wear sunscreen, a hat, and protective clothing to prevent skin damage.

So, plot out your viewing location, stock up on solar eclipse glasses and sunscreen, and get ready to experience night during the daytime. Remember, during a total solar eclipse, any lights set to turn on from dusk to dawn will turn on.

Our History.

If you have lived in the Huber Ridge Area for a while, you may recall that the Huber Ridge Area Association members started a garden show and contest in 2008 - Huber Ridge Blooms. Later, with the inclusion of Sunbury Woods, it was renamed Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms. This annual garden show and contest rewarded residents who beautified their property (and the community) with their flower gardens. With Covid concerns in 2020, the garden show was again renamed to Blendon Blooms and included ALL of Blendon Township as a drive by only event. The show continued to be managed by the HRAA Blooms committee and was citizen-led from 2008-2021. In 2022 Blendon Blooms was taken over and is now promoted, run, and judged by the Blendon Township Trustees.

And now.

Assuming the Township version of Blooms will continue, the Huber Ridge Area Association (HRAA) again wants to promote our own neighborhood excellence and beauty for the Huber Ridge Area only by recognizing and rewarding residents in our community who have:

- beautified their property with flowers, garden art, stonework, garden displays, etc.
- made significantly noticeable property improvements (primarily visible from a street view, but not exclusively) to their home and/or their property

With no desire to duplicate or diminish the Blendon Blooms contest, or to confuse the two events, we are calling this new endeavor the Huber Ridge Area Property Excellence Program.

The Second Annual Ridge Runners Dog Fest will be held at Ridgewood Park on Saturday, June 22 from 9am – 12pm.

The highlight of the event is the 1 Mile Dog Walk that follows an easy loop starting and ending at the park and taking you along neighborhood sidewalks and through the beautiful nature trail in Ridgewood Park. Signs will be posted to keep you on track and volunteers will be at the halfway point with water for the dogs.
