HRAA Plans for Speakers at Monthly Meetings

A huge part of your Huber Ridge Area Association is providing information to you, the resident. Issues such as the latest developments in the Ohio American Water rate increase settlements affect all of us. The HRAA makes gathering and providing this information a huge priority. The HRAA has three key methods for providing this information: 1) our meetings on the first Thursday of each month, 2) our newsletter, and 3) our website—www.huberridge.org.

Another way that the HRAA is looking to provide useful information to our residents is through the use of guest speakers. Occasionally, a guest speaker will agree to come and talk at the monthly meetings about a particular topic that affects the residents of Huber Ridge. Guest speakers usually can provide more in-depth information that couldn't be covered in a newsletter article or by a monthly report. Guest speakers can also address questions that residents may have.

In the past, the HRAA has supplied guest speakers such as

Chief John Belford and Road and Service Director John Giamarco from Blendon Township and Maureen Grady from the Ohio Consumers' Counsel. At the June 7 meeting, new Blendon Township Trustee Stew Flaherty was present for a question-and-answer session. Obviously when we think of issues that affect our day-to-day lives, we think of the bigger picture: the issues we see in the newspaper headlines and on television. The purpose of the HRAA and our guest speakers is to provide useful information to help residents in dealing with what may seem to be the small issues but usually are the ones that have a great impact (such as the safety of our neighborhoods and the quality of our drinking water).

I have asked the HRAA Executive Committee what topics guest speakers might address. One topic that came up right away was landscaping—more specifically landscaping in terms of overall curb appeal for our neighborhood. I have attempted to contact a friend of mine who is a horticulturist but have not been able to come up with a date for him to come out to speak with us.

That does not necessarily mean that we only have to discuss landscaping. If you have any ideas for topics you might like to see discussed, do let me know at vp@huberridge.org. Please keep in mind that the main purpose for a guest speaker is to provide information and to educate the residents, not to solicit a product or a service. We would respectfully ask that you keep this in mind when suggesting a topic or a potential guest speaker.

Hopefully, I will be able to arrange for some prospective speakers in the next couple of months so stay tuned to our website and our next newsletter for dates and speakers.

Ohio American Water Public Meeting Is Planned for Tuesday, July 10

On May 30, 2007, I attended a meeting with the Ohio American Water Company, the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, the Ohio Consumers' Counsel, and the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency regarding the Huber Ridge treatment plant area and the progress report for our stipulation and agreement. OAWC has planned a public meeting for residents served by the Huber Ridge treatment plant on July 10, 2007, at 6:30 p.m. in the Blendon Township Senior Center, 6330 Hempstead Road. **All residents are encouraged to attend.** This meeting, featuring a PowerPoint presentation, is to report

the progress made on the brown water cleanup (what has been done and what is yet to be done), to explain the new winter/summer rates and water conservation, and to answer any questions you may have.

Your feedback is important. Without your feedback, there will be no real way to gauge OAWC's progress. OAWC encourages your attendance and encourages you, when you have a water quality and/or delivery problem, to call 1-800-673-5999 and to call the PUCO at 1-800-686-7826 if your concern is not resolved after calling OAWC. OAWC has stated that it will have someone there to check your complaints within an hour.

Please mark this meeting on your calendar. To truly improve our community, we must improve its services. Without residents' feedback, OAWC cannot fix the quality of its product.



What started as a service project for the Boy Scouts has turned into a wonderful community event!

Results of this year's cleanup show what teamwork will accomplish!

- The shelter house is completely painted.
- All the trees in the front of the park are mulched.
- The volleyball court is almost completely grass free with just a couple feet left to clear.
- The east loop of the path in the woods was cleared of fallen trees.
- The west loop was completely mulched, and about 75 yards of the east loop was done.



Tom Burke did a wonderful job repainting the Huber Ridge Area signs at Buenos Aires Boulevard and Dublin-Granville Road and at Paris Boulevard and South State Street. The difference is amazing.

Beautiful donated plants were put into that bed as well as around the flagpole nearby. 

Congratulations and best wishes in your future endeavors, John!




Let's Celebrate

The Right Way to Throw Away Prescription Drugs

So you have some old prescription drugs that are left in your cabinet. What should you do with them? Save them. I might need them some other time.

Not a good choice! You probably didn't take the full prescription that the doctor ordered to be sure your condition was fully treated. Please take them all the next time. Flush them. That's what "everyone" does.

Although we hope not, some prescription drugs can be flushed. Look at the label and/or the patient information sheet to see if it is a drug which can be flushed. Indiscriminate flushing has caused the Environmental Protection Agency to announce that prescription drugs are one of the major contaminants found in increasing concentration in our streams. Just toss the whole bottle in the trash.

You're on the right track but need to add a step. While we are in an area where we think, "It can't happen here," drug abuse does cause those in severe need to rummage through trash. A prescription bottle is an eye catcher for them.

The right way:

Mix the drugs with some garbage, put it in a can or bag, then throw it in the trash. Simple and safe!

HRAA Profile: Joya Neff, BSN, MPH, RN

HRAA member and "resident nurse" writer for *The Herald* Joya Neff has lived in Huber Ridge since September of 1968. She resides on Stockholm Road with her husband, Bob, and their cat, Glory. Their younger son and their daughter live with their families in the Sunbury/Galena area; their oldest son is, according to Joya, "married to a Corvette" and living on the West side.

Joya explains those impressive initials after her name as follows: Nurses can sit for the National (Registered) Nurse Examination if they graduate from a hospital program (although there are few left), a 2-year associate degree program, or a 4-year baccalaureate degree program. If the graduates pass the examination, they earn the title "registered nurse" or RN. The BSN simply shows that the person graduated from the baccalaureate program with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing (Joya graduated from The Ohio State University, College of Nursing). The MPH stands for Masters (Degree) in Public Health—a speciality graduate

program traditionally of about 12 months (Joya earned this degree from—Oh, no!—the University of Michigan!).

When she graduated, public health nursing was her choice of practice. After a short stint as a surgical nurse where Joya missed the patient contact, she joined the Columbus Health Department and began almost 30 years of independent practice—helping people in communities with their physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual issues—and ended her career as Director of Nursing in the Ohio Department of Health.

Joya, Bob, and Glory like to travel in their motor home whenever they can. Joya also enjoys her grandchildren, sewing, crafts, and her involvement with Job's Daughters, a Masonic youth group for girls.

Joya reports that she was a member of the original Huber Ridge association, which—she says—had some successes and strong leadership but *not enough membership to endure*. She is excited about the leadership and activities of HRAA and hopes to become more helpful. Watch future issues of *The Herald* for more articles from Joya Neff, our Huber Ridge "resident nurse."

Building Permits—A Safe and Right Decision

Our Blendon Township government complex relies on Franklin County to provide services that relate to health, zoning, or building issues and concerns. Building permits *are required* for certain home improvement projects such as additions, alterations, repairs, replacements, and new buildings. Separate permits are required for electrical wiring, heating and ventilating, plumbing, moving, wrecking, shoring, use of public property, and tents.

How to Obtain a Permit

Permits are obtained through the Franklin County Department of Development and the Division of Building Regulations, 280 East Broad Street, Room 202, Columbus, Ohio. Telephone: (614) 462-3166, Fax: (614)462-7155, www.FranklinCountyOhio.gov. Their hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. Permits are valid for one year from the date of issuance. After one year, you must reapply. You are expected to sign each permit you obtain. Your signature indicates your compliance with the laws of the State of Ohio, Franklin County Building code, and all applicable ordinances.

Cost

When planning our recent home improvement project, we found it necessary to include building permits in our budget. To be honest, we did not initially consider a building permit as part of the project. Fortunately, the subject surfaced before the

project got into full swing. For an idea of cost, here is our breakdown: the application for building permit (ours is an alteration), \$120; application for heating system permit, \$65; application for electrical permit, \$50; for a total cost of \$235. The cost is usually about 1 percent of the cost of the job. Most professional estimators would build in at least 10 percent error on cost to make sure the job is budgeted correctly. Why Get a Permit?

Did we want to pay an extra \$235? Not any more than you would want to. But we did it for at least two reasons—it is the law, and we want our home to be safe for our children. The primary reason for having building codes is **SAFETY**. Keep in mind that Franklin County has minimum standards. Other municipalities have more stringent codes to follow. It bears repeating—the codes are in place for our safety. Although safety is the primary concern, your plans will be professionally reviewed for other deficiencies, such as energy concerns, which may save you money in the long run. Franklin County Department of Development is staffed with certified inspectors who have a wealth of knowledge. They are available for phone consultations about your project.



What If You Don't (or Did Not) Get a Permit?

Beginning January 1, 2008, a homeowner can be fined for not getting a permit. Additionally, contractors will face fines if they fail to obtain a permit. Currently, there are no fines in place; but you may be forced to pay for a permit for work already completed.

If you completed a project and never obtained a permit, be aware that you may encounter problems closing on your home should you choose to sell it in the future. If your bathroom, deck, addition, or other projects are not on the County Auditor's records, then the selling process may be hindered as well.

So, before you build your deck or add that bathroom, call or visit Franklin County Department of Development. Keep it safe and keep it right.

Emerald Ash Borer Is Here!

The Ohio Department of Agriculture has confirmed infestation of ash trees by the Emerald Ash Borer in Blendon Township and Worthington. Recently I found two ash trees in Ridgewood Park that apparently show signs of the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) infestation. This has not yet been confirmed by the Ohio Department of Agriculture (ODA) EAB Division as of this writing.

The confirmation of the EAB surrounding Huber Ridge and possible infestation in Huber Ridge can be serious for homeowners who have ash trees. Homeowners with ash trees really have three choices: 1) Before infestation treatment: There are treatments annually that will kill the EAB upon infestation either by a professional or by yourself. 2) Eradication: Have your ash tree cut down either before or at the first sign of infestation. You must have the tree ground up at

approved ODA businesses. 3) Let the tree die: The danger of property damage exists with this option. As the tree dies, large branches can/will fall and could hit your house, car, etc.


Editorial Guidelines for the Publication of *The Herald*

Are YOU Eligible to Join HRAA This Year?

The **HUBER RIDGE AREA ASSOCIATION** represents the interests of Blendon Township residents and merchants who are generally located in the area surrounded by I-270, Route 161, and Route 3 (Westerville Road) plus Batavia Road and Court and Bader Road and Court.

Membership is open to any adult who resides within, owns real property within, or operates a business physically located within the Association boundaries. This includes adults who reside in neighborhoods adjacent to our boundaries but not within the boundaries of another neighborhood citizens' or civic association. An adult is any person who has attained the age of 18.

Only members in good standing are eligible to participate in business meetings, to vote, or to serve in any of the elected or appointed positions. A member in good standing includes any member who is current in his or her annual Association dues and has agreed to abide by the Bylaws as they are now or may be amended in the future. A member in good standing who is an absentee owner of real property or a business entity is allowed one (1) vote in any matter before the Association membership.

Dues are set for households and businesses, not individuals. One payment covers all members of a household including their minors. The minors shall enjoy all of the privileges of membership including service on committees and participation in activities but cannot vote. The current dues amount is \$15, which covers the 12-month period through the end of the anniversary month and is non-refundable.
