# **OAWC Update**

Huber Ridge is a great community. Just ask anyone who lives here. Residents have boasted of great neighbors, community services, etc.; some have considered moving to a condo as they get older but find themselves staying because of the community. But ask anyone about one problem or fault, and you will hear one word echo with everyone: "water."

This thorn has been in this community since its inception 50 years ago. As the name has changed and the company has changed, the problem of water/sewer has escalated. As a community, many of us have united to combat the rising cost of our bills. We have had some good success combating the rising bills, but this is not enough. In the last 5 years, Ohio American Water (OAWC) has applied for three rate increases. These increases have come with a cost for OAWC of approximately \$2.2 million. By current Ohio law, OAWC can recoup 100 percent of the cost of these increases from the rate payers (their customers)—us!

Evidently OAWC has nothing to lose by frequent rate increases since the cost is passed on to us; that is, until now if we act. Recently Representatives Goyal and Grossman along with co-sponsors Representatives Garland, Blessing, Gonzales, Reece, and Fende have introduced House Bill 87—a bill to enact Section 4909.181 of the Revised Code to limit recovery of rate-case expenses for certain waterworks and sewage disposal system companies. Thank you, House Representatives, for recognizing that rate payers cannot continue to bear the cost of frequent rate increases.

Unfortunately, H.B. 87 is just that—a bill. We need this bill to become law. That's where we need your help getting it from a bill to a law.

I am not asking you to write long letters or testify, but you can if you want to. I am asking you to copy one of your water bills five times and note how many people live in your household and stress that this is a monthly bill. Write a short paragraph asking for support of H.B. 87.

The great residents of the great state of Ohio cannot continue to be exploited by utility companies which make the cost of living in Ohio extremely high. Ohio has an abundance of water, and our water bills should not reflect those of Arizona.



# **Spring Cleaning!**

As we all clean out our garages, let's not forget to take a look at our yards and the appearance of our homes. Make sure you check your gutters for damage from ice, secure downspouts, and pick up limbs that may have fallen during the ice storm. A major focus this year will be cutting down dead ash trees. There are hundreds of dead/infected ash trees in the Township that need removed. Last year the Trustees amended our property maintenance codes to allow enforcement of ash tree removal. Blendon Township has partnered with Westerville Tree Service to evaluate dead/diseased trees in the Township. Make sure you contact Westerville Tree Service for discounted pricing.

The Township has been busy over the winter months working with Franklin County on our parks master plan,

preparing for the Westerville Road project, and writing grants for a variety of activities. Blendon Township was recently awarded \$2.2 million to install sidewalks along Westerville Road once the road construction is complete. This achievement would not have happened if it wasn't for the community working together to make the Blendon Township Land Use Plan.

# **Meet Sue Mitchell** and Her Family

This quarter we have the privilege of bringing to you an excerpt from the life of a teacher! Not just any teacher but one of our own!

Sue Mitchell is known by many of us as an original owner of her home on Buenos Aires. Actually they bought a quarter of an acre lot at the end of Buenos Aires—no Paris Boulevard, no school, and no house, only a sketch. What an adventure for a young family with Craig, their infant son. Leaving an apartment in Columbus and moving to the "outskirts" was one bold step, only to be followed by enjoying the thrill of watching their home being built! Many years later as Huber Elementary School was being built, her children watched and were sure they were building it for them.

Sue graduated from Heidelberg in Tiffin with an undergraduate degree and then went on to Ohio State earning her master's degree. She began her lifelong career of teaching in Tiffin as a kindergarten (K) teacher several years before K was required. As she talked about "her" children, I could tell by the smile in her eyes that those children had a teacher who gave her all just for them. As she shared her stories, she showed me a scrapbook of her classes; and she knows of many of those families who are still in the Ridge! Although there are many stories, I have just one example to share; but first some background ....

Prior to 1962 Westerville provided a room in the Masonic Temple for a few children in this area who were ready for K. After the first families moved in in the fall of '61, the Huber area grew fast! The following fall more school space was needed, so Huber converted two houses on what is now Cairo Road to provide space for 44 kindergarteners, a firstgrade class, and a third-grade class. With the building, a little furniture, and some supplies, it seemed that everything was ready; but Sue knew differently. She needed playthings! Seeing the contractors who were building houses all around, she saw blocks! She and her mother cut and sanded enough scrap lumber to keep her class happy.

After two years she took maternity leave to deliver twins, a boy and a girl. She returned to teaching in the Westerville school system and finally returned to Huber before she retired.

Summers were play time! Glengary pool was a highlight. As pre-teens, the children explored the woods with no fear of danger. There was no park. While there were contractors to watch and woods to find creepy things in, many camping trips filled much of their family time. Of the trips they made close to home, the children's favorite was Kelleys Island.

Then during one special summer, they set out for the West. It was a trip designed to follow the tradition set down by Sue's ancestors. When she was 12, her parents took her to the sights of the Western U.S. just as their parents had taken them so many years before. They saw all of the outstanding sites on the way west—the Black Hills, Yellowstone and the Rocky Mountain national parks, the Garden of Gods, and much more. It was a trip she hopes her children will be able to share with their children in the future.

After 30 years of teaching, Sue retired; and while she had time to enjoy gardening, quilting, reading, and antiques, school was still a draw! So she volunteered in the Huber School library for 18 years watching fellow teachers and children with whom she shared her school life.

Sue's children are now grown with lives of their own; the daughter, Beth, is in Montana teaching and managing her rentals. Although she lives far away, Huber Ridge and Westerville are still "home" where she returns for visits each year. Craig and Scott are in Westerville, one a carpenter and the other a courier. Think about that! Building homes and schools got into the blood of one; travel, the other; and why are we not surprised that the daughter is a teacher. She had a superb example! Craig is a courier in Westerville and the father of Sue's two grandchildren, Nichole and Joey. One story: when Scott was about 15, he knew the van was having carburetor trouble. When Sue came home from school, she found him with the carburetor all apart on the table. She was more than surprised and asked if he could put it back. While she doesn't remember his response, he did put it back; and the car ran needing only a little "tweak" at the garage. He is the carpenter!

As we ended our visit, Sue confirmed with a smile that she was still in the Ridge because "this is where we all call home."

# Gee Willikers, That's a Great Sandwich!

How would you like a New York style deli sandwich made fresh by a New York culinary chef without having to go to New York? Well, I know a place only about 10 minutes from the Huber Ridge area where you can get one. You've got to try a new sandwich place call Gee Willikers where Chef Richie Rathkopf is making up some real good eats!

Chef Richie is from the Bronx in New York City; and, lucky for us, he moved to Ohio about 9 years ago. He now lives right here in Huber Ridge, and about 6 weeks ago opened his first restaurant—Gee Willikers, a New York style delicatessen. Richie's deli is dedicated to the preservation of the New York style deli with classics like his own freshly made corned beef or pastrami on rve with mustard. Richie's favorite sandwich is his "Richie's Ridiculous Reuben"—

freshly made lean corned beef or pastrami with melted Swiss cheese, topped with sauerkraut and his very own 1,000 island dressing on NY Jewish grilled rve bread served hot. Okay, I'm making myself hungry; and I bet your mouth is starting to water.

I've been to Gee Willikers, and it is pretty cool having a New York chef making you a fresh deli sandwich. Richie loves to be creative in his cooking to make really tasty food, and it shows. With about 28 years in the restaurant business and having learned how to cook a variety of ethnic foods, Richie offers some authentic foods like potato knish, cheese blintz, and matzoh ball soup. He also offers delicious NY Italian favorites like canolis, "Coney Island" chili, and awesome macaroni salad and coleslaw.

Gee Willikers is located at 6457 North Hamilton Road: take 161 east, get off at the Hamilton Road exit, turn left to go on North Hamilton. You will come to Warner Road and see United Dairy Farmers. Turn left at Warner and take another left into the Albany Place Shopping Center to arrive at Gee Willikers. Check out Gee Willikers on the web at geewillikersdeli.com to see Richie's menu. The phone number for Gee Willikers is 614-855-8140.

As I mentioned, you are only about 10 minutes away from a real, authentic New York style deli sandwich made fresh by a real, authentic New York culinary chef. Believe me, it is worth the trip!



# 2011 Blendon Township Rain Barrel Workshop a Success

The 2011 Blendon Township Rain Barrel Workshop was a successful, joint venture hosted by the Franklin Soil and Water Conservation District and the Blendon Township Trustees on Tuesday, March 22, at the Senior Center. This workshop educated Blendon Township residents about the benefits of capturing rain water while preventing flooding and pollution downstream. Forty residents were able to take home their own rain barrels. FSWCD offered the 60-gallon-capacity, terra-cotta colored rain barrels at a cost of only \$54 per barrel (retail is over \$130).

Rain barrels help divert water from storm drain systems, store high quality water for gardens, prevent flooding downstream, and reduce water/sewer bills as well as electrical bills from sump pump usage.

Special thanks to Trustee Stewart Flaherty for orchestrating this event for FSWCD and to Stephanie Suter of FSWCD for working with our trustees to make this event happen. This event was publicized on the Blendon Township, HRAA, Sunbury Woods, and FSWCD websites; announced on Blendon Township and HRAA Facebook pages; and published in the local Westerville papers.


