Applying for the exemption was encouraged during Auditor Mingo's presentation at a recent monthly meeting of the Huber Ridge Area Association. Here is the note:

Dear Carolyn,

I would like to thank you and the Huber Ridge Area Association for inviting Franklin County Auditor Clarence Mingo to speak at a recent monthly meeting. I enjoyed his presentation and learned of my eligibility for the Homestead Exemption due to disability.

The application process was very easy. I will receive a tax refund check from the Auditor's office for 2011 in the amount of \$684.

My air conditioning needed to be replaced this year. I'm really glad to be able to apply those funds toward that necessary expense!

This is another good example of how residents can benefit from the HRAA. I'm proud to be a member. Keep up the good work!

Always Something Going On in the Ridge

Spring and summer always bring a flurry of activity to our neighborhood, and this year is no exception. In addition to the many activities chronicled in our quarterly newsletter, The Herald; on our website, huberridge.org; and on our Facebook page, "Huber Ridge Area Association," we hold monthly meetings where we have been discussing and acting on some exciting new changes.

Since the re-organization of the neighborhood association 7 years ago, we have grown in membership to over ten times our original size. Initially we held events in the neighborhood that attracted at most 20 to 25 people. Our biggest event last year (Halloween in the Park) drew in over 400 people. It became apparent that we needed to re-evaluate our basic organizational structure. After meeting with local attorney Fritz Milligan to review our options, the membership decided that we should re-organize as an incorporated non-profit corporation 501 (c)(4) through the Secretary of State and also register our association name as a trade name. These actions now allow the HRAA to apply for recognition of exemption from federal income taxes and will provide some liability protection as a corporation that we didn't have as an unincorporated association for individual members. Registering Huber Ridge Area Association (HRAA) as a trade name protects our exclusive right to the use of our association name. For most residents, these changes will be transparent as they won't have an evident bearing on any of the events we will continue to plan, coordinate, and sponsor. As an organization, we will continue to seek opportunities to bring the residents together for beneficial and fun purposes.

The HRAA membership is currently working on a more visible change we anticipate to have in place in the fall. The Association is currently looking into landscaping designs for the signs at two of our main entrances into the neighborhood at the intersections of 161 (Dublin-Granville Road)/Buenos





Aires Boulevard and on Westerville Road/Paris Boulevard. Additionally, the flower beds at the entrance to Ridgewood Park are included in this project. Thus far, the Association has consulted with a master gardener and is continuing to explore our options with an eye toward creating more of a showcase in the entrance and parks areas. One of the best kept secrets in our corner of Blendon Township has come to light in the past few years through the HRAA Huber Ridge Bl® ®ms garden show. Our neighborhood can boast of some of the most amazing and wondrous floral and greenery displays around. What better way to celebrate this fine tradition of gardening than to create an extraordinary and inviting presentation at our entrances and park? The HRAA is inviting you to be a part of this project in some capacity especially if you have a love for beautiful gardens by simply attending our next HRAA general meeting scheduled for Thursday, July 12. Due to the holiday, this meeting which is usually held the first Thursday has been moved to the second Thursday of July; so mark your calendars if you'd like to join the efforts for beautification of our flower beds.

Speaking of our monthly HRAA meetings, this year the Association has more consistently engaged speakers for each meeting. Come meet the new local management for Aqua Ohio at the July 12 meeting. This new water company is aware of our history with Ohio American Water and is interested in reaching out to the community to share its customer service perspectives, which differ from OAWC's. We are providing a forum for the new water company to meet residents and allow it to introduce the company to the community. Aqua Ohio won't be able to change the past but is interested in entering the future with us in a more positive light, so the HRAA wants to give Aqua that opportunity to take that first step with us. Then for our August 2 meeting, Blendon Township Administrator Bryan Rhodes will return to inform us about the exciting changes for our township having to do with the Joint Economic Development Zone (JEDZ) agreement with Westerville. If you have questions, this will be a perfect time to have them answered. The JEDZ will need to be approved by the voters on the November ballot, so plan to come to learn what passage of the JEDZ can mean for our community.

The Association also hosts many resident discussions on various topics on our website (huberridge.org) in the discussion section and on our Facebook page ("Huber Ridge Area Association"). There is no cost to participate in either of our internet locations, and you don't even have to be a member of the HRAA to participate. For both, you will need to request membership; so you can post/join or just read the neighborhood chat threads. Interesting and informative things are being talked about on these sites, so join in today!

Halloween in the Park—441 attended, more individuals volunteered than we can count in just planning, setting, up, and tearing down. The Flaherty Consulting Group picked up a huge financial tab; and sponsorships included 12 restaurants, a dentist, a grocer, a hardware store, a book store, and Faith Covenant Church.

<u>Beggars Night Patrol</u>—after some vandalism a few years past, Faith Covenant Church members began a patrol; and there has been no vandalism since.

On June 7, more than 20 of our neighbors sat in a hot room (someone forgot to turn on the AC) and listened to some interesting information presented to us by Deputy Tim Schambs from the Ohio Department of Homeland Security. That organization was selected because of its program "See Something, Say Something," which is what our block watch is all about. Also helping were Sgt. Erick Moynihan from BTP and retired officer Jeff Sacksteder from CPD. The topic was very "heavy," and I hope people were not turned off by serious cases that were presented; but one thing I got from this was that people who do bad things live someplace. Do they live here? Could they live here? The answer to both of those questions is unfortunately yes. A few weeks ago, a TV news crew from Channel 10 was in the neighborhood doing a follow-up story to a serious story that is still going through the court system at the time of this writing. Last night Tom Brockman from Channel 4 was reporting on our Block Watch training and filed a positive report on our neighborhood. Good news or bad—the fact that things are happening here is an indication that we are an active neighborhood. And that activity brings me to the topic of change.

I need to know how the Block Watch program can better serve those in this small neck of the woods. The Block Watch reps will soon be better organized via email distribution lists and phone trees to assist in getting watch alerts out faster. Let's work smarter, not harder! We also seem to be a semi-passive organization at this time. Does that mean if we notice "stuff" going on at certain times of the day, we don't take a few minutes to walk around in our area just to be out and about? HRAA Household of the Quarter

Meet Chuck Marlow

[This is the beginning of the fourth year we have recognized a family within the Ridge as the Household of the Quarter allowing us to tell stories of ten families and honor them at an Association meeting.]

I saw the smiles on the faces of those who attended the general meeting of the HRAA when we drew the name of Chuck Marlow at 3360 Dempsey. He is known to many—the kind, quiet, reserved guy who is a regular at Faith Covenant Church, nurtures his vegetable garden, loves sharing his produce with neighbors as well as the Senior Center, and volunteers weekly at a food pantry. Even he grinned, but it was his knowing we all had a lot to learn! Now for the "rest of the story."

Chuck was born in Newark, and he and his older brother were raised on a small farm east of Jersey near Lynd's Fruit Farm. It was there that his love of gardening was formed.

After graduating from Alexandria High School, he came to Columbus to work for the Standard Oil Company. When he was 21, he leased a Sohio station at Glenco and North High Street, the first of three; Karl Road and Elmore and East 5th Avenue and Peters followed. During this busy time, he met and married Janet; and they continued a fast paced life, buying real estate, remodeling it, and selling. The first was an apartment building which provided enough profit to buy a twin single in Reynoldsburg where they lived in one side and rented the other. It was here their first child, Joy, was born in 1968. They sold that home, bought a three-family apartment in German Village, remodeled, sold it, and moved to Gahanna where they lived for 23 years! Joy graduated from Gahanna Lincoln High School; and during this time, she worked at Gahanna Public Library where she found her interest in library work. She graduated from The Ohio State University and went to the Columbus Main Library where she still enjoys her work. Then in 1973, their second child, Jill, was born. She graduated from the Tree of Life Christian School and from Ball State University with a teaching degree. While at school she met her husband, Paul, from Branson. They married; and while they lived there, they had two boys and a girl—three delightful grandchildren. After several years,



Paul was transferred to England; and although they are still there with the prospect of staying, they stay close. I was privileged to see pictures of several recent visits and several handwritten Grandpa cards. A Harrods truck sits on the dining room table with a story of its own!

In 1956 Chuck sold his 5th Avenue Sohio station and leased a lot and a building to form the Nelson Frame and Axel Company. In 1972 he bought the Moore Brothers Specialties Company in Newark, which sold auto and truck steering and suspension parts. They did so well that in 1988 he bought land on Scofield Drive in Whitehall, put a 7,000-square-foot office and warehouse building on it, and expanded the business into fasteners for auto, truck, and construction—better know as Nuts and Bolts! They bought their supplies direct from the manufacturers in the US and Canada, but he bought Metrics from Europe because it was the only good market for heavy-duty trucks. He sold throughout the Midwest. Often Chuck would pick up and deliver supplies, enjoy the interchanges with his customers; then while traveling in the area, he would market for business and even at times "encourage" past-due payments. His unique company thrived.

As he was telling his story, it was obvious he enjoyed every minute of these endeavors despite what must have been very tiring work. One comment he had was, "We had a great crew; Janet was a great office manager with a good staff. When I wanted to start something, I called everyone in and asked for their input. When we had a problem, we met and worked it out. I always welcomed new ideas and suggestions." I doubt he even knew he was emulating the nationally recognized standards of a leader. He just did what he felt was right and was comfortable for him. It's easy and even fun to work for a true leader like that!

Not that the above isn't enough to keep a family hopping with two girls and both parents working in a thriving business; also, during that time, they became Western Square Dance enthusiasts. But Chuck wanted more than participation. He went to Callers College at James Madison University and Cal Golden's Calling College, Hot Springs, Arkansas. After a few years of building their reputation, they formed their own square dance company. For 38 years, with his credential as an Accomplished Western Square Dance caller, he and Janet conducted many classes and festivals, calling in more than 15 states. It was during this time that they were able to take the girls with them to many events. Often the girls would say, "Dad, we have been in every school in the State of Ohio." Of course, they were referring to attending square dances in schools. The farthest he recalls was in Cheyenne; but the most memorable was in Fayettsville, Arkansas, at the American Legion Hall where he was calling and was overcome by clouds of dust rising from the wooden

floor. It only bothered the "visitors" as everyone else was used to it! They established such a following that he had to confirm an Ohio site a year ahead to assure he could "buy out" all the hotel rooms for their "Honeymoon Square Dance Weekend." After a few years at Burr Oak, they outgrew the facility and moved to Atwood Lake Lodge. This popular event was always a sell-out with a waiting list for cancellations.

It was about 1990, shortly after moving the business to Whitehall, that Janet became ill and later was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. Without the details, it was a long, hard goodbye. By having the business, they were able to travel to a lot of pretty places and meet a lot of nice people. But after her passing, Chuck wanted to retire and sell the business after 32 years of travel. Later Chuck bought a house on Halkirk off Taymounth where he lived for a couple years until he saw the home he now owns on Dempsey with a for-sale-by-owner sign in the yard. He knew the area and liked what he saw. He made the deal with the owner and again began to remodel. His backyard was one of the selling points and now is filled with more plants than I could count and more varieties of vegetables than I knew existed including castor beans. Nuisance Barking Dogs Are No Fun!

[Editor's note: Scott Mueller began his dog training profession in 1975 as he moved his family to Columbus, Ohio, to initiate The National K-9 Training Center. In 1979, he founded the National K-9 School for Dog Trainers where more than 1,600 students worldwide have attended. He is the author of *Mueller's Essential Guide to Puppy Development* and was inducted into the International Association of Canine Professionals Hall of Fame in 2010. The HRAA appreciates his willingness to share his knowledge with us.]

With summer upon us, we all enjoy the outdoors, sharing in family activities. In the evening, we may enjoy leaving a bedroom window open on a cool evening as we go to sleep. There are few things more frustrating than to have a neighborhood dog barking for an extended period of time, breaking the silence. Some dog owners actually give little thought to what the neighbors might be experiencing.

Certainly we are pleased when our dogs bark for good reason, but nuisance barking is another story. The following may give a better understanding as to why dogs bark and offer a few tips that may allow your neighbors a good night's sleep or a peaceful outdoor family gathering.

Why Do Dogs Bark?

- ★ Dogs want to be with family, not tied out or fenced in an area.
- Many dogs may become territorial in outdoor confined areas.
- They may be hungry or thirsty, cold or hot near heat stress
- They may not be socialized around people and/or other pets and become defensive and fearful.
- They may suffer from separation anxiety when left alone.

Helpful Tips to Stop Barking

With proper training, most dogs will enjoy being in the house with their owners. Nylabone chew toys and Kong balls stuffed with milk bones or peanut butter serve well to occupy their time when their owner is unable to be with them.

Seek the help of a qualified trainer who can teach you how to enjoy your dog through training. We don't think twice about educating our children from kindergarten to 12th grade, yet we assume our dogs will understand what we expect of them. Remember that our dogs want to please us, but they don't know how. It's up to us to be proactive and take charge of our dogs through proper training and exercise.

Due to the severity of some barking cases, your trainer may resort to one of several bark collars that activate upon barking more than two or three times, depending on the ability of the collar. Some collars activate a citronella spray.

Others may emit a high frequency that irritates the dog's sense of hearing. The last collar, known as an electrical collar (E-collar), is self-activated like the first two but offers a pseudo-electrical stimulation that works off a 3 volt-9 volt radio battery. Since there is no amperage behind the stimulation of what feels like a mild shock, it rarely has any adverse effects on the dog other than it gets its attention. It is my suggestion that you seek the help of a professional when using these tools; and remember, there is no substitute for your dog's education. There is no such thing as "man's best friend" until we teach a dog how to become such!
