Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms Annual Garden Show and Contest

It's our 10th Anniversary Tour and we are thrilled to celebrate ten years of great gardeners, beautiful blooms, generous donors, and dedicated volunteers! If you are new to the community and do not know about Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms, it is a **free**, publicized garden tour where gardeners in Huber Ridge and Sunbury Woods welcome the general public to tour and appreciate their garden. It is a judged event that rewards all participants and also selects three place winners. The tour takes place rain or shine (we hope for the shine). How many and which gardens will be open for tour varies from year to year depending on a successful application process. (See application for details.)

NEW date this year! Many expressed that an earlier tour date would show off their gardens better. In response, we moved the date up. Our new, earlier tour date is **Sunday, June 25**, from 1-5 p.m. We are hoping the earlier date will result in a greater and more diverse response. Knowing we have many skilled gardeners in the community, we are encouraging interested gardeners to apply starting May 1. The deadline to apply is June 12, at 5 p.m.

Also new this year we are including the Blooms application on page 4 of *The Herald* for your convenience. In the past we have cased the Huber Ridge and Sunbury Woods neighborhoods looking for potential garden entries. We may still case the communities for great gardens, but we very much appreciate resident-initiated applications. Some back yards are beautiful but as we drive through the community, it is very difficult to see backyards from the street view. So if you have worked hard and want to share your beautiful blooms, then please apply.

A little bit of history. This event began in 2008 for the Huber Ridge Area as a result of the encouragement and prompting of Blendon Township Trustee Stewart Flaherty, an avid gardener himself. Stewart believes that beauty is contagious, so each year he has "put his money where his mouth is" by donating the first place prize of a \$100 gift card to a home improvement store. The intention was always to expand the tour to include more of Blendon Township, but that did not happen until our eighth year when we included Sunbury Woods. Thank you, Stewart, for your generous giving and encouragement to our gardeners!

Volunteers have worked hard to make this event happen every year. Elisabeth Clegg (multiple duties), Hannah Clegg (photographer), Carolyn Cordray (multiple duties), and Marje Obrist (certificate design and production) have been involved with Blooms since the beginning.

By completing and submitting this form, you will be considered for competitive entry in the Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms FREE garden tour and contest held Sunday, June 25, 1:00 - 5:00 p.m. The tour is publicized via various venues such as Facebook, the HRAA, Inc. website and Dispatch media. Your photograph and photos of your garden will appear on our Facebook pages (Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms) and in the HRAA, Inc. newsletter, The Herald. Your address may be listed in Dispatch media as this tour is open to the public.

Applications will be accepted starting May 1 through the June 12 deadline. Completed entry forms must be delivered, mailed, or emailed to: Pam Clegg, 3614 Makassar Drive, 43081 blooms@huberridge.org and received no later than **June 12, 2017, 5 p.m.**

Eligibility: You must reside in the Huber Ridge or Sunbury Woods areas, be 18 or over, and have a tour-ready garden. Criterion for selection of a “tour-ready garden” include safety for visitors (no tripping hazards, etc.) and maintenance (weeding, trimming, deadheading etc.) in addition to a multitude of other factors such as landscape design, use of plants, curb appeal, environmental friendliness and overall aesthetics. A Blooms committee member(s) will pre-determine and confirm your eligibility for the tour within three days of receiving your application. (You will be notified.) Entries may be limited.

Agreement: *Upon notification of eligibility, participants will receive a Blendon Huber Ridge Blooms participant yard sign that will be placed in your front yard. You agree to keep your participant sign visible in your front yard until 5 p.m. the day of the tour. (Participants will receive this yard sign not more than 30 days prior to the tour and/or within 3 days of selection.) Please return signs to Pam Clegg the day of the tour – at 6 p.m., when you attend the Gardener’s Reception.

*Participants agree to maintain a smoke-free, alcohol-free, safe yard (no clutter/hazards) and manage pets and/or children (safety) while guests are present and while judges are judging.

*Participants agree to provide a “tour-ready garden” especially on tour day and be host/hostess on the day of the tour for the entire four hours; 1-5 p.m. This is for your safety as well as for the safety of those touring. If you cannot be home June 25, then please enter another year. Details about what to expect and do on tour day will be emailed or delivered.

*You agree to attend our annual Gardener’s Reception held in **Ridgewood Park**, June 25, 2017, (tour day), from 6-7 p.m. After all, you worked hard and deserve refreshment and reward! Winners of the garden show will be announced at our Gardener’s Reception and all prizes/gift bags will be distributed at this event as well. Remember to bring your Blooms yard sign with you to this event.

*Only judges/photographers should enter your yard prior to the tour. Judges and photographers will wear name tags and you will know who they are via email. Gardens will be judged between June 12 and June 21; hours and days yet to be determined. You will be notified in advance. You do not need to be home or outside during judging.

Prizes: 1st place - \$100 gift card to a home improvement store (donated by Stew Flaherty, Blooms Chairman)
 2nd place - \$50 gift card to Oakland Nursery (donated by Sharon Ricker, Blooms judge, past 1st place winner)

Did you know that the Kid's Lunch Club began in 2011, and that our very own Ridgewood Park was the first and only site open at that time? The program has successfully expanded each year to now include 9 other sites!

In 2016 WARM supplied 18,943 lunch meals and 29,214 weekend meals to eligible children, totaling 48,157 meals. Additionally, KLC distributed 80,778 pounds of fresh produce at the sites.

The Westerville Area Kids Lunch Clubs is a FREE program that provides children ages 1-18 with nutritious meals and coordinated enrichment activities throughout the summer when school is not in session.

You do not have to register to attend, just show up! The site at Ridgewood Park runs rain or shine each day, from 11:45 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. For other sites, please visit the WARM website at <http://www.warmwesterville.org/> and click on "Services" at the top of the webpage and select "Kids Lunch Club."

Annual Plant Swap Is May 20th

I've been playing in the dirt. It's something I've done since I was little: I never missed a chance to make mud pies! Not much has changed in the past (mfmfmf) years. It's not as easy as it used to be, so I've found new ways to satisfy the urge. Here are a couple of tips for you, as you get ready to make your own mud pies.

This is actually from my Great Aunt Fran, who worked in her yard as long as she was able. I inherited her little red wagon then, which she used as a gardening cart. She put a cushion in the bottom and had her tools beside her in the wagon. She sat on it with her legs over the side, using her feet to move through the yard as she tended her flower beds. The wagon served me well, until I found a plastic gardening stool. The seat lifts up, and I store my tools there. It has little places for carrying a drink, too.

Have you given any thought to installing a rain barrel or two? Quite a few of us in the neighborhood have at least one. I have two, and have found they help save money on our water bills. We were able to buy them from the Franklin County Soil and Water Conservation's program a couple years ago. Go to their site, <http://www.communitybackyards.org/participate>, for more information.



Another suggestion I'd like to give you is concerning native plants. We planted some last year, and hope they have become established. (We used the free water from our rain barrels to keep them watered after planting them.) In a couple years, I hope I will be able to propagate them.

This brings me to my last suggestion. If you have been so fortunate that you have an abundance of plants, thin them out and put them in containers for sharing. The annual Huber Ridge Area plant swap is on May 20th at Ridgewood Park. Simple guidelines to follow:

- Put your plants in containers you can part with, so the recipients won't have to return them to you. Some of the best are disposable plastic cups or storage containers. Larger plants can be put in garbage bags with damp newspapers so they won't be too heavy.
- Be sure to identify your plants as well as you can with all the information you have. Helpful facts about sun/shade, height, spreading, and water/drought tolerance would certainly be appreciated. If you don't have that information, bring them anyhow! Some of the local green thumbs might know or will look them up for you.
- Try to keep roots in dirt, as bare roots are less likely to survive transplanting.

Mrs. McDonough has spent over 20 years teaching Kindergarten at Huber Ridge and has decided to retire at the end of this school year. I know she has greatly touched the lives of many children and families in the Huber Ridge area. We cannot thank her enough for all of her contributions throughout the years!

Huber Ridge Elementary loves being part of this great community and appreciates your continued support!




The HRAA Spring Community Garage Sale - May 6th
