"Should I Call the Police?"

I usually tell people that if you are wondering whether or not to call the police, the answer is almost always, "YES". As a police officer, I would rather get 100 calls that turn out to be nothing, than have one person not call when they should have. Recently there have been several highprofile incidents of people calling police about very minor incidents or calls that were perceived as being based on race, religion or ethnicity. This excerpt from the Department of Homeland Security's "See Something, Say something" webpage might help;

The "If You See Something, Say Something" campaign respects citizens' privacy, civil rights, and civil liberties by emphasizing behavior, rather than appearance, in identifying suspicious activity. Factors such as race, ethnicity, and/or religious affiliation are not suspicious. The public should only report suspicious behavior and situations.

Another way to look at it is that the police might be able to assist the person. If a car has circled the block several times the driver might be lost. We respond and help people with directions all the time. If someone is sitting in a car for what seems to be a long time they might have had a breakdown. This is another problem that police assist people with every day. A person sitting on the ground or in a vehicle not moving might be having a medical issue.

Blendon Township Police Officers do not respond to reports of suspicious activity with lights & sirens and in a confrontational and accusatory manner. We respond to see if we can be of assistance. Most of the time it turns out to be normal activity with a reasonable explanation. Sometimes people need and want our assistance and sometimes they don't want to talk to us at all. Many times we make a new friend. Sometimes people think we are harassing them and we assure them that they are not required to talk to us and a free to go about their business if there is no reasonable suspicion of criminal activity. But every now and then, the call to police prevents a crime or solves a crime.

Lastly, if you are going to call us about suspicious activity; Don't Delay, Call RIGHT AWAY. Report suspicious activity to Blendon Township Police by calling our radio dispatcher at **614.889.9494**. Report Emergencies in-progress by calling 9-1-1.

Your Winter Fire, Carbon Monoxide Safety Checklist

According to the National Fire Protection Association, nearly half of all home heating fires occur between 5-9 p.m. during the months of December, January and February. The Westerville Division of Fire (WFD) encourages residents to follow these steps to help keep families warm and safe this winter:

Keep Heating Equipment Clean and Clear

According to the NFPA, personal heating devices are the second most common causes of home fires during the winter. Failure to clean solid-fueled heating devices, like chimneys, is the leading cause of these fires. Failure to keep flammable items (like paper, furniture, etc.) far away from heat sources was the top contributing factor to home heating fire deaths. The NFPA recommends keeping flammable items at least 3 ft. away from sources of heat (including candles and space heaters) and to keep fireplace ashes outside in a tightly covered metal container at least 10 ft. away from the house at all time.

Be Aware and Prepared for Carbon Monoxide Risks Around Your Home

Winters in Ohio can be tough and many residents are prepared with portable generators. While these tools will come in handy during a power outage, they can pose serious health risks if used improperly. Exhaust from generators contains odorless carbon monoxide, called "the silent killer". That is why firefighters recommend keeping the devices away from windows and as far away from the home as possible. Home heating systems are the top contributor to carbon monoxide-related deaths. WFD firefighters say it is imperative for all homes to be equipped with multiple carbon monoxide alarms to alert families in the event of an emergency.

Keep Holiday Trees Well Watered and Ditch Them When Dry

The NFPA says that holiday tree fires, while unlikely to occur, are more likely to be deadly than other home fires. When decorating, fire prevention experts recommend replacing any lights with broken bulbs or exposed wires and to remember to unplug the tree before leaving the house and going to bed. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), a dry holiday tree can ignite and burn faster than a newspaper. While it can be a bummer to take a dry tree to the curb after the holidays, it's the safest thing to do. Holiday trees are considered yard waste and can be included with normal collection. Be sure to remove all decorations, cut the tree into 4 ft. lengths and tie up in bundles.

Winter Gardening

Now is prime time to get ready for Spring. During the winter months you can go ahead and start your garden grooming using the following tips.

Outdoors

- January is a good time to check trees and shrubs for rodent feeding.
- Use branches from Christmas trees to mulch perennials.
- Avoid walking on your lawn during thaws to avoid damage.
- You can plant shade loving plants during this time.
- Continue to provide food and water for wildlife as the sources are limited during the winter months.

- During March you can purchase trees and shrubs for planting outside later in the month.
- Rake debris from the lawn when the soil is fairly dry.

Indoors

- Move house plants away from frosty window seals.
- Group house plants to increase humidity.
- Allow water to reach room temperature before watering.
- Try growing parsley and herbs in containers in sunny window sills.
- Look through seed and nursery catalogs for gardening ideas.

- Consider planting fruits as well as fragrant varieties this coming season.
- In February replant house plants and frost heaved plants.
- Start plants from garden seeds.
- Draw out your garden space on paper and choose quality seeds.

Prefer to let somebody else do the heavy lifting but still want to enjoy garden beauty? Visit the Franklin Park Conservatory and Botanical Gardens and you will be in awe. Here you will find over four hundred plant species from all climate zones. They even offer educational classes and ideas for gardeners of all ages and skill sets.

During the Month of December Huber Ridge has maintained an enrollment of just under 560 students. Of the 560 student around 225 of those student utilize transportation provided by Westerville City Schools. The rest of our students come to school in some other form of transportation such as daycare van, car rider, and walker.

In the winter months the amount of students who walk to school provides a unique challenge to our school. Our head custodian, Kyle Brady, has hundreds of feet of sidewalk that he works tirelessly to keep clear of snow and treat appropriately with salt and de-icer. For our 200 plus students who walk to and from school each and every day they appreciate his efforts and your efforts in the community as well.

For those of you who are able to remove the snow from your sidewalks in a timely manner after each snow please know we at Huber Ridge appreciate your efforts. This simple, yet labor intensive task, helps keep our students safe, out of the street, and makes their trek to and from school each day a bit easier during the cold winter months.

Last fall Huber Ridge Elementary held a walk a thon to raise funds for our playground. In addition to those funds we were also awarded a grant from Aqua Ohio. The money has been used to buy stencils to paint a US map, an obstacle course, multiplication table and hop scotch grid to name a few. Be on the lookout this spring as we start these playground updates.

Another bit of excitement was our fall Scholastic Book Fair, chaired by Becky Wallace. This year we collected money for a program called All For Books. Students were given a bag to collect change to bring back to school. Over \$344 was raised. Huber Ridge Elementary was then able to use that money to purchase 61 books and donate \$100 to the Westerville Little Library. In turn Scholastic also donated \$344 worth of books to one of their charities. Our book fair raised 2574 in scholastic dollars that are put back into Huber's media center.

We would also like to thank everyone who worked, baked or donated money to our Election Day Bake Sale. It was a huge success and it was because of our great Huber Ridge Neighborhood.

Winter Wildlife

Wildlife can use all the help we can give to survive the winter months. While they have natural instincts and learned strategies, the interference of humans in our demands on the natural environment (clearing forest areas for roads, parking lots, and structures) makes it more difficult for them to find food and shelter. Luckily you can help by following some, or all, of these easy tips.

Leave the Leaves

Never got around to raking that last batch of fall leaves? Good! They are perfect natural nourishment for the soil and provide food and cover to a variety of wildlife along the way. Leafy remnants are even used by birds in the spring when they build their nests.

Provide Water

Providing an unfrozen source of water to wildlife saves them from having to leave their normal territory and search for it in potentially dangerous areas. Keep the water in your birdbath from freezing by using a birdbath heater. These can be found at most hardware stores or online. Positioning the birdbath near a bench or tree will allow squirrels and other animals to access the water, as well. Don't forget to clean it weekly and refill daily. Another option is to put a tennis ball, ping pong ball, or other small floating object in your birdbath. The wind will blow the

object around and keep the surface of the water from freezing over completely.

Go Wild


In your garden that is! Leave some undisturbed areas around your yard with piles of leaves or brush so that animals and insects can use them for nesting material.

Feed 'Em

Food is scarce in the colder months and even those animals that stash food may have a hard time accessing it if the ground is frozen. Putting out a consistent food source will help our wild neighbors not just survive, but thrive. Birds love a variety of seed and suet. Squirrels will be thrilled with nuts such as hazelnuts, walnuts, almonds, and even chopped apples, beans, carrots, or spinach.

Look Around

Take a look around your yard and think about the animals that usually visit and come up with your own ideas on how to make it wildlife friendly. The Ohio Wildlife Center (https://www.ohiowildlifecenter.org/) is a great resource for more information and they also offer different family friendly programs throughout the year where you can learn more about native Ohio animals.

Aldi has long been my favorite store and like many of you, I have been eagerly anticipating the new and improved location. And it did not disappoint. If you haven't ventured over to the new Aldi store yet, I recommend checking it out.

The new parking lot wraps around the corner entrance of the store and you can access the carts on either side of the entrance. (remember to bring a quarter to use a cart – you'll get it back, don't worry.) Large windows flank the spacious entrance. Veer right to enter the store and you

are right in the middle of plenty of produce – fruits, veggies, and a large organic section. From there, you weave through the aisles to find all the standards – bread, cereal, condiments, deli, snacks, canned goods, etc. In the middle, you'll find the household, pet care and baby items as well as the Aldi specials and seasonal items. These change frequently – you can check out what is on special through the Aldi app available in your app store.

Two things to remember when you go:

- Take a quarter for the cart (all of which have seats for two little ones)
- You'll need your own bags either bring yours from home, or you can purchase some reusable or paper bags

in the check out.


And the best thing about Aldi; the quality you get is just as good (if not better) than name brand alternatives and costs less. Happy shopping!

Trash Issues?

One of the hot topics in the HRAA facebook group is missed trash pickup. If you find that your trash doesn't get picked up on trash day, typically Friday except on holiday weeks, here is what you can do. You can also find this information at www.huberridge.org under the FAQ section.

- 1. Call Rumpke to report ASAP at 1-800-828-8171. Document the date and time of the call. Also document the outcome of the call (ex. left message on voicemail, spoke to a representative who indicated someone would be out to pick up my trash in the afternoon, etc.)
- 2. Email the township to report the missed pickup with the details of your contact with Rumpke. Send email to refuse@blendontwp.org. This email goes to the Blendon Township Administrative office where the staff reaches out to the route supervisor every time a service complaint is emailed to this address.
